Word and Work

s you read this we will be in the middle of our congregation's ministry fair. The Outreach Committee has decided this time to extend the fair over a several week period with brief presentations each Sunday as a part of our worship service.

The theme of this fair is the title of this article "Word and Work" and it is the thinking behind that theme that I hope to explain to you in this article. As a start in this explanation I would remind you of a series of presentations which we all witness every evening if we watch the network evening news. Those presentations are the constant drug commercials that interrupt the narrative and images of the days' newsworthy events. If you will recall, in those drug commercials when they give you the "pitch" for the medical product it is accompanied by all kinds of attractive

images of healthy and happy people. However they are further obligated to give you the side effects of the drug they are selling. If you can listen carefully these side effects can be dire and sometimes they even include death! What often escapes our notice, however, is that the pleasant and happy images that were presented during the pitch



continue throughout the disclaimer which is spoken so quickly that it is only minimally intelligible. What these advertisers understand is that those pleasant visual images will substantially drown out the darker implications of the disclaimers. While this is all perfectly legal, what I would like to suggest is that these ads present a discrepancy be-

tween word and work.

The word I would like to use to highlight this discrepancy is "integrity." One of the definitions that my dictionary gives for that word is "The quality or state of being complete or undivided." The word is related to the word integrate which means "to coordinate or blend into a functioning whole." What is obviously happening in the commercials I have mentioned is that the words and the images are not integrated and only function by letting the images dominate over the clearly unpleasant meaning of the legally obligated words. While it is never explicitly stated, it is intended that most of us see those happy images in the commercials as the works those drugs produce.

I mention this example in order to state that we should not have this discrepancy between what we say and what we do. The word integrity should be aptly and correctly applied to us as disciples of Jesus. The word that we offer the world in this role is that God loves us and offers himself to us in the person of Jesus. With that proclamation comes the obligation to connect and integrate our actions with our announcement of the compassion of God.

The Outreach Committee is sponsoring this ministry fair in order to give each of you as members of our congregation the opportunity of further making our word and work one so that the Kingdom of God may be truly seen as happening among us. Each of the brief Sunday presentations is meant to tell you of the purpose and needs of that ministry and to

offer you the possibility of joining in that Kingdom effort. Some of the presentations will deal with the possibility of direct physical support of people in need and other ministries will deal more with the background structure which makes those direct expressions of God's love possible.

What the committee asks of each of you is that you carefully and prayerfully reflect on your gifts and inclinations and see if there is some way that those abilities and interests can connect with the purposes and needs of the ministries presented. What we are not trying to do is create a sense of guilt and legalistic obligation that forces you grudgingly into these commitments. We fully understand how much so many of you are already doing and do not wish to make a busy life even busier so that you have little time for furthering your relationship with the God you serve. We know that many of you bring a Christian sense of vocation to your jobs and that will be the primary way you serve God, but if any of you feel the touch of God's spirit to further involve yourself in the work of his Kingdom that we are presenting to you, we offer you an open invitation to make this a time of further commitment and discipleship.

A final word I would offer in helping you consider whether you would like to engage in one of these direct or indirect ministries. It is a question that I ask of myself and I ask of you. Am I living a life of integrity; are word and work connected in my life as a follower of Jesus?





Adult Study—Wednesday evenings

On Wednesday night at 6:45 p.m. Pastor Bob will be leading us as we explore the Bible through a video series entitled "That The World May Know" with biblical teacher and historian Ray Vander Laan who is an ordained minister with the Christian Reformed Church and has completed graduate studies in Jewish Studies in



the U.S. Israel, Turkey and Egypt. His teaching focuses on understanding the Bible by guiding people through the land, culture and historical context of Scripture. Filmed on location in the Middle East, we will see and hear the significance of biblical stories in the life of God's people then and now and how they call us to faith. Pastoral Search Update & Prayer Request

Pray for the Search Committee:

Pray for patience. Pray that the group would wait for God's timing.
Pray that your search committee will have the mind of Christ and agree.
Much of the process is subjective. Personal opinions and preferences are involved. Differences can divide. Ask that they would heed Paul's advice for unity, having the humble attitude of Jesus Christ. (Philippians 2:1-12, especially verse 5). It is so easy for us consciously-or unconsciously- to bring our own agendas into church business.

Pray for wisdom to choose the right person. Pray that the pastoral search committee will renew their minds in the Bible so that they can have Wordcentered wisdom (Romans 12: 1-2).

Pray for discipline for your search committee and other church leaders. The search process will require a great deal of follow- through on the parts of individuals. It will also require that they do not digress from the agenda or retrace decisions they have already made. Pray for unity and agreement between your elders and the pastoral search committee.

Pray for Your Next Pastor:

Pray that God would increase his passion for preaching the Word of God.

Pray that God would give him a love for your church and the strength to leave his current position (if the candidate senses that is God's direction).

Pray that your next pastor would begin relationships at your church in the right way, even during the search process.

Pray that God would prepare your future pastor to shepherd your flock more effectively through the trials and blessings he currently faces.

Pray for your next pastor's family. Pray that God, who knows each detail about each member of your pastor's household, would give the members of his family strength as they consider leaving their current setting and going to a different church, or beginning pastoral ministry for the first time.

Pray for the People in Your Church:

Pray for patience. The search process can go on longer than expected. It is hard for people doing the work of searching. It is also difficult for those in the congregation who must wait without knowing exactly what is going on. Pray that your people would trust the leadership and uphold you during the whole process.

Pray that your people would learn to place a high priority on biblical preaching. It is easy to gravitate toward personality, programs, a particular "ideal" age, etc. Pray that, above all, the congregation would call a pastor who will proclaim the Word without apology.

Pray that your people would not react to a previous pastor. Some churches struggle with wanting a pastor who is like their old one (they had a good experience). Other churches want someone who is just the opposite.

Conversations Between Parents and Teenagers Improving Your Game, Part 1 By Susan Oh Cha, Yumi Bryana Cha

In many ways, what happens in tennis parallels conversations between parents and their teenagers. In tennis, we have to know the game. In our families, we have to know each other.

In tennis, I have to know where to hit the ball in order to win. There are clear lines that I should not cross if I want to score. It is the same in parent-teen relationships: If parents want their kids to talk to them, it's important that they communicate within the boundaries of what is respectful and loving.

If my mom and I do not really know each other, then our talks will feel superficial. When we aren't considerate of each other's feelings, we end up hurting each other. And when I want to express my thoughts and feelings, but my mom is not focused on what I'm sharing, I feel like walking out of the room altogether. All of these can result in lost opportunities to connect.

Susan's View

People speak an average of 16,000 words per day. 1 Of these, parents may use hundreds of words each day to communicate with their teenagers.

This raises some questions for me as a parent. What percentage of our family's conversations is about getting to know each other more? What percentage of our conversations consists of words that are disrespectful and hurtful? What percentage of our conversations indicates a readiness to hear one another?

The average parent wants to know their kids and to be available to dialogue with them. Most do not intend harm. In fact, we love our kids; we want what is best for them. We are often willing to sacrifice ourselves to ensure that they are healthy and happy. However, these thoughts and feelings are not communicated well when we spend much of our time lecturing, making discouraging comments, withholding permission for their requests, and threatening them in order to control their behaviors.

Let's take a look at a model of a parent who connects authentically and positively with his children. From the very beginning in Genesis, God relates to humanity in the following ways: 2

Actions	Manifested in Words
Instructing	"Be fruitful and increase in number" 1:28
Empowering	"Rule over every living creature" 1:28
Providing	"I give you every seed-bearing plant They will be yours" 1:29
Affirming	"God saw all that he had made, and it was very good" 1:31
Setting Boundaries	"you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil" 2:17

The story of our relationship with God begins with words that instruct, empower, provide, affirm, and set limits – words that help us thrive rather than fail. These words set the tone for the unfolding of events and interactions in human history.

Of course we can't measure up to God as parents. However, God calls us to be a reflection of him to the world. This means that by God's grace and strength, we need to parent our children as God has demonstrated in parenting us – through words that forge a healthy connection.
